Chapter 1 : Introduction

Intruduction : Naogaon district lacked any college for the advancement of women’s education before the country became independent. A group of people started a project in July 1972 to create a separate women’s college in the district to provide higher education for girls. The main leader of the project was Mr. Md. Abdul Jalil, one of the planners of the glorious liberation war and a distinguished politician, who held an M.C.A. degree at that time. He was joined by the late Gias Uddin Sardar and many more passionate people. Thanks to their relentless efforts, the college made rapid progress and the journey of “Naogaon Women’s College” commenced in Naogaon Girls’ High School. Mr. Md. Mohsin Ali was the first principal and later on March 25, 1982, Mr. Md. Tofazzal Hossain, the founding principal of Rajshahi Shahmukhdum College, succeeded him. The undergraduate (humanities) department was opened in 1974 with the humanities and science branches at the higher secondary level. On April 26, 1985, the then President Hussain Muhammad Ershad declared the nationalization of Naogaon Women’s College. Following the declaration, the college was nationalized on July 1, 1985. With the active efforts of former State Minister Mr. Md. Alamgir Kabir, late Principal Mr. Md. Tofazzal Hossain and the Governing Body, the College was relocated to its current location, which is situated in the center of Naogaon city. The late Bashir Uddin Khan, the then director of the Cannabis Society, donated the whole property of the Bahadur College campus. This place was previously known as BMC and it was the main campus of the college. Later, due to the efforts of some prominent persons of the city and on the directions of the then Hon’ble President, Naogaon Government Women’s College was renamed as “Government BMC Women’s College, Naogaon”, which was later endorsed by the government.

3.1 Key Achievements and Highlights of the Year of the College

Academic highlights:

- In 2022(Exam of 2021) Pass rate of Hons department students is 62.80%
- In 2021(Exam of 2020) Pass rate of Degree students is 76.34%.
- 78% Attendance in Tutorial exams

3.3 Key Achievements and Highlights of the Year of Institutional Development Grants (IDG)

Our 2nd refurbishment and renovation package (Package Name: Refurbishment and Renovation of Seminar rooms, classrooms, Teachers Common room, Library, Computer Lab-2 of Govt. BMC Women's College) was fully completed last year. We received a Digital Smart Board under central procurement process. We also purchased some furniture and benches through OTM package named "Furniture & Fixtures for Computer Labs, Classroom, student common room, departments, teachers common room etc."

The outcome of interactive smart board provided centrally:

- The smart board is interactive and a computer too. Therefore the teachers do not need extra teaching materials like Chalk, duster, marker pen, laptop etc.
- Students are enjoying the classes more as complicated things are easily drawn and shown on the smart board by the teachers.

The outcome of OTM (work) package (as stated before):

- A prayer corner for students and mothers was established in the student common room.
- The flooring of five classrooms, one classroom cum auditorium, three honours departments, and their seminar rooms were tiled. The inside walls were newly painted, making them more conducive to learning.
- The classrooms were furnished with new benches. The new window/door screens have enhanced the aesthetic value of the academic environment.
- New lights and fans were installed in the classrooms.
- The ceilings of three honours departments and seminar rooms were furnished with false ceilings.
- Some washrooms were repaired and painted.
- New vertical venetian blinds were installed in the honours departments and seminar rooms.
- Six electric water purifiers were installed on the college campus.

The outcome of OTM (Furniture) package:

- There are 15 fixed chair (3 seated) placed in the student common room removing the benches. Students are now feeling more comfortable to spend time there.
- 18 fixed chairs supplied in the seminar room of political science department. Now the students have better experience for studying in there.
- 70 new classroom desk (bench) were placed in our new classroom.
- 3 honours departments were furnished with new furniture.
